Too many students will begin the 2015 school year without even the most basic classroom necessities.

We're inviting you to make a positive impact on a child's life. You can purchase school

supplies or make a cash donation for students in need in Marshall County. If you choose to make a financial donation, please make checks payable to the House of Compassion and note on the check for school supplies. All funds will be used to purchase items needed to complete the backpacks.

Families must register at the House of Compassion to receive these school supplies. Families qualify by meeting standards based on the current poverty guidelines. Last year, we were able to help over 1,000 students through the School Supply Distribution.

## **Vacation Bible School News**



Last winter, the children had a "Milk & Bookies" party to collect books with the idea that they would be donated locally. This did not work out – apparently God had a different purpose for them. It turns out that Rosedale, the community we served on the mission trip, does not have a library. We saw the need for a "little free library" there and discussed it as we traveled and made sense of our mission work after we got home. We contacted Dani, the missionary there, about whether this was

something the community would welcome, she told us that the county librarian had visited shortly before we came, and they were talking about how they could start a little free library on the front porch of the community center. We responded by designating the Rosedale Community Center Library as our VBS mission project. The VBS offering totaled more than \$530, and paid for 4 boxes of donated books (Gutekunst Public Library let us select some books for adults from their book sale free of charge) to be shipped to West Virginia. The rest of the money will be used to support the library over time. Thank you for your support of this project.

Little free libraries are small, weather-proof boxes on posts that house books. They are usually privately owned and in people's yards, but available to all. Books are not checked in or out, and there are no fines. They operate on the honor system. The first one was built in Hudson, Wisconsin, in 2009, and they have become very popular.

## Luke's Ministries Melanoma

Melanoma is the most serious form of skin cancer. Even so, if diagnosed and removed while it is still thin and limited to the outermost skin layer, it is almost 100% curable. Once the cancer advances and spreads to other parts of the body, it is hard to treat and can be deadly.

During the past 10 years, cases have increased more rapidly than any other cancer. It is the fastest growing cancer in the US and world-wide.

Melanoma is a malignant tumor that originates in melanocytes, the cells which produce the pigment melanin that colors our skin, eyes or hair black or brown. It is most heavily concentrated in moles. The majority of melanomas are therefore, black or brown. Melanomas occasionally stop producing pigment and when that happens melanomas may not be dark, but skin colored pink, red or purple.

Some melanomas are more dangerous than others. Some melanomas may occur in one site only or are localized. Invasive melanomas are more serious and are more deeply embedded into the skin and may have traveled from the original tumor through the body.

Four basic types of melanoma are:

1. Superficial spreading melanoma - the most common and travels along the top layer of skin fairly long before penetrating more deeply.
2. Lentigo Malignamelonoma - an invasive form that spreads superficially and then penetrates deeply. It is quite different as it usually appears black or brown. This type is sometimes found in dark skinned people. It is the most common in African Americans and Asians.
3. Nodular Melanoma - invasive at the time it is discovered. Usually recognized when it becomes a bump. The color is usually black. It is the most aggressive of the melanomas.
4. Acral Lentiginous Melanoma – most common in people with deep skin color as blacks and Asians. It usually develops on the palms, soles, or nails. It's normally brown or black. Often mistaken for a bruise or blister, but it can penetrate into the underlying layers of skin.

In general, the risk of developing melanoma increases with age, but younger people can also develop skin cancer.

As with other types of cancer, it is likely that many melanomas result from a combination of environmental factors and genetic factors. The American Cancer Society has identified several substances that may contribute to melanoma including coal tar, the wood preservative creosote, arsenic compounds in insecticides, radium and of course, ultra violet light rays from the sun or tanning machines.

Seek advice from a physician immediately if you have any question about something present on your skin.

### **Make Me an Instrument of Your Peace**



**John 14:27** Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid.

Every week in church and in our homes we pray for peace:

“Bring peace to those who are in war-torn and oppressed countries.”

“Lord, give us peace in our hearts.”

“God, bring peace in our time.”

We need these prayers of peace. Sometimes I'm afraid we think that prayers for peace are only associated with a war in a far-off land like the war in the middle-East and the threat of radical Islam. But we know all too well the personal and local situations that disrupt our peace. For example, there has been a big push lately to identify bullying in our schools and our workplaces. We worry

about the growing lack of personal responsibility in our country which leads to families and communities torn apart.

Our friends in care facilities have personal concerns that disrupt their peace. Some are at war with illness and the ravages of advanced years on their bodies. Some live with headaches worrying about finances. Some deal with the anxiety of loneliness and isolation. Traffic is not peaceful. Shopping is not peaceful. Work is rarely peaceful (ask any teacher).

Jesus recognized that the peace of abiding in God's love is disrupted when we humans are left to our own devices, decisions and worldly worries. For this reason, He gave us the message to seek peace beyond our worldly issues and, as His disciples, shows us a way to live as agents of change to help replenish peace in the lives of those around us.

"Lord, make me an instrument of Your peace." This prayer is believed to have been inspired by the life and teachings of St. Francis of Assisi, who lived many centuries ago. It still rings true today. For those of us who want to be Christ's disciples, being an "instrument" means turning our prayers for peace into actions of peace.

"Peace I leave with you; My peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid."

Let us keep praying for peace – for ourselves and others.

We pray for peace of mind – help us slow down and think of You.

We pray for God's peace in our hearts as we realize Your love for us.

We pray for peace in our family. May we express love in our actions.

We pray for peace in Your church. May we recognize our common life in Christ.

We pray for peace in our world. We pray for everyone, including our enemies.

## JULY SESSION ACTIONS

The Stated Session meeting of First Presbyterian Church, Marshalltown, met at 7:05 p.m. Tuesday, July 21, 2015, in the Lower Lounge.

Moderator Rev. Dr. Richard A. King opened the meeting and Kurt Lynch presented the devotions and opening prayer.

**Motion prevailed** to approve the minutes of the June 16, 2015 Stated Meeting as printed.

**Eric & Tressa Voss** were interviewed for membership. **Motion prevailed** to accept the Voss' as members of First Presbyterian Church.

**Aleta Larimer and Doris Flanagan** were removed from the roles due to their deaths; Aleta's death 7-5-2015, and Doris' death 7-14-2015.

**Financials** - Matt Broshar presented the Financial and Investments reports. June giving was very good, and was the best June giving in the past three years. Matt presented an offering comparison sheet for the years of 2013-2014 and 2015 showing income and expenses. There was a little activity in the investments.

**Missions/Evangelism** - No report.

**Finance & Stewardship** – Larry Schrum reported that if giving stays as it is now, we will be about \$19,000 short of the budget and will have to borrow money from our investments to pay our bills. There is a need to plan for a reduced budget for 2016. Larry noted that the money in the CE Scholarship Fund needs to be looked at to determine how it can best be used.

**W & M** - No report from their committee meeting.

**Communion**—142 on June 7, and 141 on July 5. Home Communion was taken to **Jean Brennecke, Betty Emmons, Bette Etter, Jean Evans, Doris Flanagan, LaVone Lee, Nathalie Lynch, Lavine Meyer, Rose Muschick, Connie Montover, 11 Embers residents and 20 residents at Glenwood Place.**

**Christian Education**—Karin Podhajsky presented a printed report noting that VBS was successful, and the extra training for the youth helpers was beneficial. They will use this format for VBS next year and then look at making a change. They discussed whether or not to offer classes for the adults next year. The Rotation Model was reviewed and may change to a three to four-year rotation rather than a six-year. Doug Bacon made a presentation on the need for new computers for Sunday school. He can get six laptop Dell Business Class computers with a 14" screen at a cost of \$460 each. Each computer is loaded with Windows 8

software, has wireless capabilities and has a one-year warranty. Doug has secured funding for each computer. As a recommendation from the CE Committee, **motion prevailed** to approve letting Doug move forward to get the funds, and to purchase the laptops for the church. They will be ready for Sunday school in September.

**A & P Committee** - No report.

**M & I Committee** – Craig Henze presented a printed report. They need more members to attend the meetings. An Inquirers' class was held and new members will be joining the church soon. They continue to work on the pictorial directory, and hope to have it ready to send in to the company soon. The I-Cubs game was well attended. A wiffle ball game was cancelled due to a lack of people signing up for it. The committee discussed finding out who our 50+ year members are and specify a Sunday to honor them. Craig is working on a date in the fall to have a cook-out and bonfire at Rich King's for the men of our community.

**Property** - Kurt Lynch reported that people operating the sound board want to have videos to be shown given to them by 8 a.m. so they can make sure they will operate properly during the service. The cross-over to the Gathering Place was discussed. Brighter lights are being installed in the Sanctuary. The committee discussed the possibility of moving the nursery upstairs in the former bell room. They may try it on a temporary basis.

**Other Business** –Elders were asked to take the remaining bird houses to someone who would enjoy them.

The **August 18, Session meeting** will be held at Rich and Valerie King's home at 6:30 p.m. for a cook-out and time for spiritual growth and fellowship. There will be no business meeting unless necessary. Spouses and guests of Session members are also invited. Each Elder should bring a salad or dessert. Rich will provide the meat, the beverages and the paper products.

The meeting was closed with small group prayer.
