As an agency totally funded by private donations, we feel very blessed to serve those in need in our community. Here are some of our 2017 accomplishments

**Soup Kitchen** 14,156 meals; Monthly Average 1,180 meals (213 volunteers)

**Supply Closet** 937 families (unduplicated), 431 new families in 2017  
Monthly Average 514 families, 1,584 individuals

**Medical/Dental Vouchers** 576 vouchers, 224 households \$15,200.

## 2018 VBS



This summer, VBS will be June 24-28. The theme will be

*Shipwrecked*, and our castaways will learn that Jesus rescues us from our loneliness and worry. He rescues

us when we struggle and when we do wrong. Be looking for opportunities to get involved in this fun, exciting week. A meeting for those interested in planning this special week will be held at 11:15 on Sunday, February 11.

## Luke's Ministry Malaria

Malaria is a life-threatening disease caused by parasites that are transmitted to people through the bites of the infected female Anopheles mosquito.

In 2015, 95 countries and territories had on-going malaria transmission. About 3.2 billion people in almost half of the world's population are at risk for malaria.

Malaria is preventable and curable. Increased efforts are dramatically reducing the malaria burden in many places. The rate of malaria globally has fallen by 37% for those who are at risk, in all age groups and 60% for children under five years of age.

Sub-Saharan Africa carries a disproportionately high share of the global malaria burden. The region was home to 88% of malaria cases and 90% of malaria deaths.

Transmission is more intense in places where the mosquito lifespan is longer (so that the parasite has time to complete its development inside the mosquito) and where it prefers to bite humans instead of animals. Transmission also depends on climatic conditions that may affect the number and survival of mosquitoes, such as rainfall pattern, temperature and humidity. In many places, transmission is seasonal with the peak during and after the rainy season. Malaria epidemics can occur when climate and other conditions suddenly favor transmission areas where people have little or no immunity to malaria.

Partial immunity is developed over years of exposure, while it never provides complete protection. They can also occur when people with low or no immunity move into areas with intense malaria transmission to find work or as refugees.

Vector control is the main way to prevent and reduce malaria. Two forms of vector control are insecticide spraying and sleeping under insecticide treated mosquito nets, as well as regular insecticide spraying within the confine area.

Antimalarial drugs can also be used to prevent malaria. For travelers, malaria can be prevented through appropriate medicines.

Areas high in Malaria are India, Sub-Saharan Africa, the Greater Mekong sub regions of Cambodia, Thailand, Viet Nam, Latin American and to a lesser extent, the Middle East.

The symptoms of malaria are:


- Fever
- Headache
- Chills
- Vomiting

These can range from mild to severe. The symptoms can occur five to seven days after being bitten by the mosquito. If malaria is severe respiratory distress, severe anemia, metabolic acidosis.

There currently are no vaccines available, but there are medicines for treatment.

The global goal is to track where the mosquitoes are by surveillance, use of insecticides, and development of a vaccine and the extermination of malaria.

Be aware of this when traveling abroad.



James 5:13-16 "Is anyone among you in trouble? Let them pray. Is anyone happy? Let them sing songs of praise. Is anyone among you sick? Let them call the elders of the church to pray over them and anoint them with oil in the name of the Lord. And the prayer offered in faith will make the sick person well; the Lord will raise them up. If they have sinned, they will be forgiven. Therefore, confess your sins to each other and pray for each other so that you may be healed. The prayer of a righteous person is powerful and effective."

## JANUARY SESSION ACTIONS

The Stated Session meeting of First Presbyterian Church, Marshalltown, met in the Lower Lounge Tuesday, January 16, 2018.

Moderator Rev. Dr. Richard A. King opened the Session meeting at 7:08 p.m., and Darrell Meyer presented the devotions and opening prayer.

**Motion prevailed** to approve the December 19, 2017 minutes after being amended to remove the words 'for final approval' from the motion made in Finance report.

Pastors and staff reports were presented.

**Finances:** Larry Schrum presented the Financial and Investments reports. Giving in December was very good, but was lower than the three-year average. Spending was low for the month. Pam Brandenburg will do a review of the church books. **Motion prevailed** to put the \$5,300 from two checks noted to use where needed, in the General Budget Fund. **Motion prevailed** to pay in January all the per-capita apportionments (Presbytery, Synod & National, administrators of the denomination). A presentation of the approved 2018 budget will be presented at Adult Sunday school on Sunday, January 21.

**Mission/Evangelism:** Matt Broshar reported the Christmas Eve offering of about \$1,200 will be put into the Pastor's Discretionary Fund. The Mission's stock fund balance has now exceeded \$52,000 which has qualified for a distribution to the Missions budget, if the trustees of the fund approve it. The committee voted to send \$300 for Daniel Graeff's medical mission trip to Honduras in March 2018.

**Worship & Music: Communion**—182 on Dec. 3, 157 on Jan. 7. The committee reviewed the Christmas services and are making plans for Lent and Easter.

**Christian Education:** Jon Rottink reported on materials for VBS could be more expensive this summer, but the starter kit for 2019 has already been purchased. VBS is scheduled for June 24-28, 2018, and the theme is "Shipwrecked, Rescued by Jesus." The CE Committee will pay ½ the fee for each child attending camp this year. The summer youth mission trip was discussed along with the plans for the Chili Cook-off fundraiser for the mission trip. The Awesome Presbys hosted a

sledding party at Wirin's, and they volunteered to serve at the House of Compassion Soup Kitchen. The Sweetheart Banquet is scheduled for Saturday, February 17. Fall Wednesday Club was discussed as the Marshalltown School District plans to eliminate early out days on Wednesday afternoons. The spring session of Wednesday Club will start on April 15.

**A & P:** Roger Anders reported on the Mission Study Committee noting the next step is for Session to do a review of the compiled MSC survey and small group input, followed by discussion, ideation, and planning for both incremental and larger improvements. The preliminary plan includes data summarization, interpretation, prioritization, organization, action plan, Oversight and constant communication along the way. A provider has been located to do the church budget review in the first part of the year. **Motion prevailed** to allow Elders not currently on Session to stay on the A & P Committee, and to co-chair other church committees. **Motion prevailed** to hire Tom Bower as the church Visitation Pastor for 10 hours per week for six months at a salary of \$5,000.

**Membership & Involvement:** Craig Henze reported the committee will help with the Chili Cook-off following the Annual meeting.

**Property:** Kurt Lynch reported that a new camera has been installed in the Narthex. The entrance doors security was discussed. In the future, both north doors of the church will be relocked at 9:15 a.m. each Sunday for safety purposes. The Marshalltown police will do a facility review and then, come do a security training with Session and staff. The yearly fire department inspection has been done and the committee is working on the items that department says need attention.

**Stewardship:** No report.

**Nominations:** Darrell Meyer noted that Roger & Donita Anders will need to be approved as Deacons at the Annual meeting. The committee is working to get people to serve on the 2018 Nominations Committee.

**Other Business:** **Motion prevailed** to retain the 2017 check signers for 2018: **Mike Gerbo, Craig Henze, Julie Lynch, Larry Schrum & Kyle Young.** Elder Training for all Elders will be held Saturday, Jan. 20, from 9:30 a.m.– 3:00 p.m. at Ellsworth College in Iowa Falls. Presbytery will take care of the cost of the training. A sheet to sign-up to give devotions at the 2018 Session meetings was passed around. The Covenant for Presbyterians will be discussed at several Session meetings before approving it.

The meeting was adjourned with small group prayer.
