Boxes will be available in Fellowship Hall with a pamphlet inside with instructions on how to pack and suggested items to include are small toys, school supplies and hygiene items. Be sure to notice also, what NOT to include (candy, gum, tooth paste, liquids, war related items or breakables).

A donation of \$9 is critical to cover shipping costs. Families or individuals could go together to share costs of gifts and postage. If you wish to participate but choose not to fill a box, you can write a check for postage to Samaritan's Purse and find someone to partner with who will fill a box.

To insure arrival before Christmas, boxes need to be returned to Fellowship Hall by Sunday, November 11.

The House of Compassion "Stuff the Bus" school supply distribution was held August 18, and 20, and was a huge success thanks to the community. After the

postponement, we weren't sure all those HoC clients and people affected by the tornado would get the word, but thanks to social media and other media sources, all worked out well. Backpacks filled with basic school supplies were given to 1,043 students in Preschool through high school August 18, and 20. We found out that "being affected by the tornado" had far reaching effects. Some lost their homes, but a few didn't even live in Marshalltown and had lost jobs because of the tornado. We had enough supplies for everyone and backpacks for nearly everyone.

Whether you set out a box at church, or donated money or supplies to the bus, we really appreciate all that you do. We couldn't do this project without your help. Out of town donations

filled in the gaps, so everyone will be starting school with what they need. Much of the money collected was used to buy more backpacks or will be used to order headphones (an item on the school supply list, we were unable to have at the time of distribution).

Families who received the supplies were very grateful for the help. One woman said, "I would like to express my gratitude to everyone who helped and put this event together. In times like this (loss of housing due to tornado) the assistance is highly appreciated. Thank you for everything you have done." Another lady wrote, "Thank you for donating school supplies for this time of need. The tornado ruined our car. This is one less stress for our family." The hundreds of thank you notes from children and their parents always makes working on this project worthwhile. Getting students started in school each year can be incredibly expensive, and nothing seems to be getting cheaper. Having a tornado damage or destroy part of your town creates even greater needs for many folks.

This town is amazing by showing their thoughtfulness when people are in need. This is a great community project with many hands working together to make a positive impact on our youth as they start their new school year. Thank you to everyone who helped and donated!

Luke's Ministry Anemia

Anemia is a condition that develops when the blood lacks enough healthy red blood cells. These cells are the main transporter of oxygen to organs. If red cells are deficient in hemoglobin, then the body isn't getting enough iron.

Anemia is the most common condition in the U.S. It affects about 3.5 million Americans. Women and people with chronic diseases are at increased risk of Anemia. Certain forms of anemia

are hereditary, and an infant may be affected from the time of birth.

Women in the child bearing years are particularly susceptible because of blood loss from menstruation and the increased blood supply needs during pregnancy.

Seniors also have greater risk of developing Anemia because of poor diet and other medical conditions. There are more than 400 types of Anemia which are divided into three groupings.

1. Anemia caused by blood loss. Red blood cells can be lost through slow bleeding over a long period of time and can often go undetected. This kind of chronic bleeding commonly results from conditions such as:
 - a. Ulcers
 - b. Hemorrhoids
 - c. Gastritis or inflammation of the stomach
 - d. Use of non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs such as Aspirin, Motrin, Aleve, Tylenol, etc.
 - e. Menstruation and childbirth in women
2. Anemia caused by decreased or faulty blood cell production:
 - a. A body may produce too few red blood cells or the blood cells may not develop properly. In either case, Anemia may result. Red blood cells may be faulty or decreased due to abnormal red blood cells or the lack of minerals and vitamins needed for red blood cells to work properly. Conditions associated with these causes of Anemia include the following:
 - Sickle Cell Anemia - an inherited disorder that affects African-Americans. Blood cells become crescent shape because of a genetic defect. They break down rapidly so that oxygen does not get to the body's organs, causing Anemia. The crescent shaped cells also get stuck in the tiny blood vessels causing pain.
 - b. Iron Deficiency Anemia - this type occurs because of a lack of the mineral iron in the body. Bone marrow in the center of the bone needs iron to make hemoglobin or red blood cells. The result is Iron Deficiency Anemia. This can be due to:
 - Poor diet, especially in infants, teens and vegetarians
 - The metabolic demands of pregnancy and breast feeding

that deplete a woman's iron stores

- Menstruation
 - Frequent blood donations
 - Endurance training
 - Digestive conditions such as Crohn's Disease or surgical removal of the stomach or small intestines
 - Certain drug, foods and caffeinated drinks
3. Vitamin Deficiency Anemia - can occur when a person is without enough Vitamin B-12 and Folate are deficient. These vitamins are needed to make red blood cells. Types are:
 - Megaloblastic Anemia - B-12 & Folate are both deficient.
 - Pernicious Anemia - Poor Vitamin B-12 absorption caused such conditions as Crohns Disease, in intestinal parasite infection or surgical removal of the stomach or intestines, or HIV infection.
 - Dietary Deficiency - eating little or no meat may cause a lack of Vitamin B-12; while overcooking or eating too few vegetables may cause a foliate deficiency.
 - Other cause for vitamin deficiency are pregnancy, certain medications, alcohol abuse, intestinal diseases such as Tropical Sprue and Celiac Disease

During early pregnancy, sufficient folic acid can prevent defects such as Spina Bifida. Bone marrow and stem cell problems can prevent the body from producing red blood cells.

- A-Plastic Anemia occurs when there is marked reduction in the number of stem cells or absence of these cells.
- Thalassemia occurs when red blood cells don't mature or grow properly.
- Lead Exposure is toxic to the bone marrow leading to fewer red blood cells. Lead poisoning occurs in adults from work related exposure and children from eating paint chips. Improperly glazed pottery can also taint foods and liquids with lead.

Anemia caused by destruction of red blood cells:

- Inherited conditions such as Sickle Cell Anemia and Thalassemia
- Stressors such as infections, drugs, spider or snake venom and certain foods
- Advanced liver or kidney diseases

- Vascular grafts, prosthetic heart valves, tumors, burns, chemical exposure, severe hypertension and clotting disorders
- Enlarged spleen

Symptoms of Anemia vary according to the type, underlying cause and underlying health problems. Symptoms common to many types are:

1. Fatigue
2. Loss of Energy
3. Unusually rapid heart rate particularly with exercise
4. Shortness of breath and headache with exercise
5. Dizziness
6. Pale skin
7. Leg cramps
8. Insomnia

See your physician if you feel you have these symptoms or others that might be caused by Anemia.

SEPTEMBER SESSION ACTIONS

The **Stated Session meeting** of First Presbyterian Church, Marshalltown, met in the Lower Lounge Tuesday, September 18, 2018.

Moderator Rev. Dr. Richard A. King opened the Session meeting at 7:10 p.m., and Ed Peng presented the devotions and opening prayer.

A quorum was in attendance.

Motion prevailed to approve the August 21, 2018 Stated Session Meeting as printed.

Pastors and staff reports were presented.

Finances: Matt Broshar presented the Financial reports noting that giving in August was good. It was ahead of last year's giving. There is a positive cash flow. Matt added a new line item in the budget for "tornado relief" noting the Missions Committee is tracking how these donations are being spent.

Motion prevailed to allow the Missions & Evangelism Committee (M&E) to have up to \$5,000 of tornado donations to use for tornado victims and \$2,000 be transferred into the Pastor's Discretionary Fund; any expenditures the M & E Committee has that are \$2,000 or above will need to have Session approval before making that payment. Property will submit bills that should come from the "tornado relief" fund as they need them.

Investments: Gail Boliver presented a Finance & Investments policy which was discussed.

Motion prevailed to approve the adoption of this policy as written. This will be included in the Policy & Procedures manual.

Mission/Evangelism: Matt Broshar reported that they submitted four grants totaling \$78,000 to Presbytery. The grants are for Jonathan's House, Morning Star Ministries, Well Spring project and one to Facilitate making First Presbyterian Church a Mission Hub. The last grant would be used to install additional showers and make improvements to the church to accommodate teams staying at the church who are here to help with the long-term tornado repairs. **Motion prevailed** to approve these grants. The committee discussed sending thank you notes to churches & groups who have given to the Tornado Relief Fund. They are planning to bring Bette Medina from Breaking Cycles Ministry in Guatemala to this church on October 10, as a speaker.

Worship & Music: Communion—151 on August 5, and 136 on Sept. 2. Mike Gerbo reported that the electronic drum kit has arrived and is being used. The committee may have a silent auction to sell the old drum set. The Sept. Hymn Sing was well attended. Garry Rottink will replace Mike as leader of the Hymn Sings. Wynona Anderson will review the 2019 usher list.

Jews for Jesus may return in 2019. A new tech is needed to run the sound system after Mike moves.

Christian Education: Kyle Young reported that Sunday school teachers met to review the three-year curriculum and discussed the coming year. The first day of fall Sunday school started Sept. 9, and the teachers were commissioned that day. Candle Lighter training was held for third to eighth graders. The children's backpacks were blessed on August 19. Third graders will get their Bibles on September 23. Trunk or Treat will be planned for Oct. 31, in the church parking lot.

A & P: Doug Butler reported that Pat Kremer and Deb Williams interviewed two ladies to help in the nursery when no one else has volunteered. We are waiting on them to return their paperwork to be hired. Pat Kremer is phoning church members to get them to volunteer in the nursery. The financial materials have been given to Pam Brandenburg to do an external financial review for 2017. Doug will work with Rich to participate in a first or third Tuesday morning staff meeting. After much discussion, **motion prevailed** for Marshalltown First Presbyterian Church to join the Fellowship Community which teaches Bible based materials and will better support the pastor.

Membership & Involvement: No report.

Property: Richie Ritter reported that the flat roofs on the church have been repaired. They are discussing possibly putting a metal roof on the rest of the church. The update work in Fellowship Hall is progressing well. They still need to get new windows in the kitchen and Fellowship Hall. **Motion prevailed** to allocate \$17,500 from Buildings and Grounds Fund to pay for \$6,500 audio/visual improvements, \$4,500 for new ceiling tiles, \$4,500 for new windows and \$2,000 for expendables.

Other Business: None.

The meeting was closed with small group prayer.
