What if we followed Passaro’s example and complimented people regularly? Philippians 4:8 (NIV) instructs us to think about things that are noble, lovely, admirable, excellent and praiseworthy. By extension, turning those positive thoughts into words causes “kindness pebbles” to spread God’s light in ripples throughout someone’s day — and, doubtless, through ours.

St. Valentine, a Roman priest, was martyred in 270 A.D. for loving Jesus. Some sources say he performed weddings after the emperor banned them; others say he rescued Christians from Roman prisons. Two centuries later, the pope declared February 14, St. Valentine's Day.

According to legend, the priest signed his letters "Your Valentine." Later, Christians followed suit to honor him. By the mid-1700s, friends and sweethearts exchanged heart-shaped trinkets or sent handwritten notes of affection on February 14.

Three In One

Everyday objects can serve as simple lessons about biblical truth. To illustrate the profound concept of the Trinity, for example, some teachers use an apple, an egg or a three-leaf clover. During winter, you can point to a kid-friendly snowman to describe how God is Three in One.

The ball of snow on the base represents God the Father, our Creator and strong foundation. The middle ball, with stick arms reaching to the side, reminds us of Jesus, who died on the cross. And the snowman's head stands for the Holy Spirit, our ever-present Counselor who helps us and speaks God's truth to us.

Luke's Ministry Pneumocystis Pneumonia

This a form of pneumonia caused by a yeast-like fungus. Pneumocystis Pneumonia is not commonly found in the lungs of healthy people, but being the source of opportunistic infection, it can cause lung infection in people with a weak immune system. Pneumocystis pneumonia is especially seen in people with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, HIV/AIDS and the use of medications that suppress the immune system. Signs and symptoms of this illness include:

- a. Fever
- b. Non-productive cough because sputum is too thick to be coughed up.
- c. Shortness of breath with exertion
- d. Weight loss
- e. Night sweats

The fungus can invade other visceral organs such as spleen, kidney, liver, but only in a minority of cases.

- a. Pneumothorax is a well-known complication of PCP. An acute history of chest pain with breathlessness and diminished breath sounds is typical of pneumothorax. The diagnosis can be confirmed by chest x-ray, sputum cultures, and/or lung biopsy. This is an extremely difficult situation and may lead to death.



JANUARY SESSION ACTIONS

The **Stated Session meeting** of First Presbyterian Church, Marshalltown, met in the Lower Lounge Tuesday, January 15, 2019.

Moderator Rev. Dr. Richard A. King opened the Session meeting at 7:15 p.m., and Pat Kremer presented the devotions and opening prayer.

A quorum was in attendance.

Motion prevailed to approve the December 18, 2018 Stated Session meeting as printed.

Motion prevailed to approve the **removal of LaVone Lee from the membership** due to her death 1-3-2019.

Finances: Matt Broshar presented the Financial reports noting that giving in December wasn't as good as in previous Decembers. Some donations came in but were designated for areas other than the budget. Congregants have donated from their Charitable Trusts; and have given \$5,000 in stocks that are to be used "where needed." Session will decide where to use this money at a future Session meeting. The church has received the insurance check from the tornado damage to the church. Matt needs to complete a summary of the tornado funds.

Mission/Evangelism: Matt Broshar reported that the church is still working with the Roses family concerning their light & gas bill. **Motion prevailed** to pay their electrical bill at \$910. No action was taken on the Local Optional Benevolence Funds and where the money will be spent. They discussed whether they will continue to support Lori Adams, and Rich King reported that Wellspring Missions has contracted for six wells to be done in the next drilling season. Pat Kremer has agreed to be on a community committee for people who continue to need long-term recovery from the tornado.

Worship & Music: Communion—132 on December 2, 224 on December 23, and 152 on January 6. Home communion was taken to: **Ralph & Rhoda Bender, Ron & Dorothy Wilson, Beth Harrison, Irene Hopp, Ralph Ward, Mike & Brenda Miller, Nathalie Lynch, Ruth Hayes, Rose Muschick, Bea Lebeda and 13 residents of Glenwood Place.** A new electric knife is needed to slice the communion bread. A new brass altar set has been received and dedicated at the January 13, 2019 worship service. Some debris has gotten into the organ trumpet pipes due to an opening in the space above the ceiling over the front window. Estimated repairs and tuning of those pipes could cost around \$2,000. More people are needed to run the sound board on Sundays. Plans are being made for Lent and Easter activities: an Ash Wednesday Healing service, Jews for Jesus, Maundy Thursday service, an ecumenical Good Friday service, and Easter Sunrise & Easter services.

Christian Education: Doug Bacon reviewed past accomplishments of the committee and up-coming activities. The Chili Cook-off will be held Sunday, January 27, following the Annual Meeting. The Sweetheart Banquet will be Saturday, February 16. Wednesday Club starts February 20, through April 24. The youth mission trip may go to the Texas area and VBS is tentatively scheduled for June 23-27. Lakeshore Camp is changing their billing process and will bill the parents ½ the camp fee and bill the church the remaining ½ of the fee.

A & P: Doug Butler reported that they are scheduling mid-year reviews for the staff for the first week of February. They have an agenda for the Session Retreat scheduled for Saturday, February 9, and gave the schedule to the current Elders. Each committee needs to set up goals and objectives for the coming year. As a recommendation from A & P, **motion prevailed** to compensate Michelle Wilkinson five hours per week from the time of the tornado thru the end of the 2018 year for the extra hours she's worked. The pay will come from the tornado fund.

Membership & Involvement: Heather Rottink reported the committee is helping prepare food for the Annual Chili Cook-off. Jon will let the committee know how they can help with the Sweetheart Banquet February 16. The committee continues to look for more members to serve on this committee. The committee needs to go through the membership rolls to find people who could be removed. They are working on recognizing the older members of the church. They will encourage people to sign up to be fellowship hosts, cup washers, greeters and be sponsors of the weekly donut order. The Cradle Roll is being updated. The committee is looking into making a new church pictorial directory.

Property: Matt Broshar reported that the Fellowship Hall remodel is almost completed. Volunteers continue to work on upgrades in the Gathering Place. Repairs will be needed in the bell tower and front window area to keep it from leaking or getting debris in the organ pipes. The roofing company should start replacement of the church roof very soon. A metal roof will be put on the church.

Nominations: Rich King reported the committee still needs one more person to be an Elder, and four people are needed to be Deacons for the 2021 classes. Rhonda Buzbee and Barb Schrum have agreed to be Deacons for a one-year term.

Pastor Rich King closed the meeting with prayer.
